**From the Spiritual
Coordinator**



This term the value we are looking at is Love. At the opening Chapel this term we looked at how love is not a feeling it is an action. Below is an abridged sermon on love by Pastor Dieter Dell'Antonio:

Jesus says to us: 34"A new commandment I give to you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. 35By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

This is a tall order. Can we really do this? Most of us would perhaps say that there is no way that we can love other people in the same way God loves us through his Son Jesus Christ who died on the cross for us. Some might say: We can only do this with the help of the Holy Spirit, especially once people have hurt us. When Jesus was asked which of the commandments were the most important he says: Love God and love your neighbour! When asked who the neighbour is, Jesus tells the story of the Good Samaritan. Therefore, the command to love other people is not entirely new.

What, then, is new about Jesus' commandment? -- First, Jesus provides a clear model of the love that he requires: "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (v. 34). If we want to understand Christian love, we only have to look at Jesus' life and actions. He is our example, the touchstone on which we measure ourselves.

-- Second, it focuses on the Christian community -- we are to love Christian brothers and sisters. "It troubles interpreters sometimes that the command Jesus left is not a command to love the world or to love one's enemies, but to love one another." This is entirely new! It means that Christians are to love other Christians. This was a problem in the early church, until God made it quite clear that salvation was not only for Jewish Christians but also for the Gentiles.

The focus is on loving action rather than loving feelings. In chapter 15, Jesus will repeat the commandment, saying, "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (15:12-13). In his own life, Jesus translates love into action that benefits the beloved. He calls us to do the same. How can we here at Living Waters do this?
